

It has been a very busy term for Kindergarten in PE! At the beginning of the term the children were learning how to hit a ball through their partner's legs using a hockey stick and then dribbling it across the hall. Their confidence increased and then they managed to pass the ball to their partner more confidently.


They have loved their Gymnastics lessons and have learnt how to balance across a beam and jump safely from a greater height. They also used a springboard for jumping onto mats and hurdles for improved balance.

More recently the children have created dance moves by using a given theme. They enjoyed dancing like a robot and doing their own version of a Mexican wave!

Every fortnight the students from Queen Mary's Grammar school have been teaching the children football skills, which have included shooting and scoring penalties, passing and running with the ball. They have also been taught basketball skills including dribbling and shooting at the hoop!

One of the highlights was our farm trip to Lower Drayton Farm with Nursery to meet all the farm animals. It was a really great day out, with lots of fun and laughter.





Transition have been amazing historians this half-term, finding out about the eruption of Mount Vesuvius in Pompeii in 79AD. We began by looking at a fresco of Sappho, and using our deduction skills to find out who she was and what her life may have been like. We found Italy and Pompeii on a map and then began to look at historical evidence to find out what life would have been like for those living in Pompeii 2000 years ago. We found out that Pompeii was part of the Roman Empire and ruled by Emperor Nero and his soldiers. We then made our own moving split pin soldier!

We then looked at an animated timeline of the eruption itself and looked at some pieces of Primary and Secondary evidence, such as a letter from Pliny, an eyewitness to the tragedy, and some more modern paintings. We used these to build up a picture about how the day unfolded for the residents of Pompeii. We then used watercolour paints to create our own masterpiece, called 'The Last Day of Pompeii.' We thought really carefully about which colours would convey the mood and atmosphere. We also showed off our amazing writing skills with our own diary entry. We will be finishing the topic by using our Science skills to make our own volcanic eruption! Well done, Transition!



Form I

Form I have been carrying out lots of investigative work to enhance their learning this term. We have been learning to measure in our Maths lessons; using a ruler and cm for shorter objects like a paper clip and a metre stick for longer objects like the classroom. We have used balances and weighing scales to measure the mass of a range of fruit and vegetables. We have used mathematical symbols to compare their weights and then order them from lightest to heaviest. We have then investigated volume and capacity and been solving some tricky problems.

During Science week, we explored this year's theme of 'connections' through the theme of Colours. We were fascinated by a series of experiments to see how colours connected together to make new colours. We also linked Science Week to our topic of Animals and Living Things through our study of food chains and life cycles. We currently have 5 caterpillars that we are observing and are looking forward to the next stage of their development.



Form II



Once the top-secret home of the World War Two Codebreakers, we learnt about the start of MI5 and the important work of the many men and women who worked there. It was so secret there is still not a complete list of 9000+ people who were based there between 1939 and 1945.



We were able to enjoy the rare opportunity of witnessing a genuine Enigma machine as well as encountering a range of historical codes and ciphers as we worked together to decipher messages to solve a puzzle.

We learned about the importance of the work done at Bletchley and the code breakers involvement in the numerous deception plans undertaken in 1944 to fool the Germans about the intended location of the D Day landings.

Upper II enjoyed exploring the different exhibits and the different interactive displays.




Hydesville Maths Challenge









Science week

British Science week took place at Mayfield with enthusiasm and creativity. The theme this year was 'Connections'. Every class took part in Science activities involving the theme. Pre-Nursery, Nursery and Kindergarten went on a trip to the farm to explore the connections between animals and our world. Kindergarten also enjoyed connecting the animal faces together as part of the topic. Transition and Upper II had a go at bridge building and explored the connection between weight and strength. Lower II investigated vibrations when building a seismometer. Form I observed the lifecycles of a butterfly and frog, which have the theme of connections and wrote explanation texts involving colours including chromatography, travelling food colours and fruity sweets. Form II were crime detectives for the day and had a go at fingerprinting their own fingerprints to explore the connections between them! Finally, Lower III were thinking like Victorians to solve a range of problems using techniques from the era! Due to the bad weather, the VR animal workshop was postponed but took place the following week and was enjoyed by all! Well done to all who entered the poster competition. Voting was held after school and throughout the next day where pupils, parents and staff could vote on their favourite posters and a winner was chosen from each age category with a joint winner in the Upper II/Lower III category. It is with great excitement; we can announce our plans to redevelop Mayfield's school library. The continued development of our reading provision has been a focus for the staff this year, we have introduced electronic library software 'librosoft' and accelerated reader as part of our improvements. We are planning to purchase a purpose-built building similar to the designs above for the new library. The new building will allow children to access the library before and after school as well as during their break times. By positioning it on the ground floor it makes it easier for all members of our school community to access.

The benefits of a stand-alone building are:

- Easy access for pupils in main school during break & lunch times
- Large enough for whole class story times
- Easy access for our younger children as there are no stairs
- Opportunities to hold parent and child story sessions

We hope this additional resource will raise the profile of reading in school and children who read for pleasure achieve better results in all subject areas. We are planning to get the building for the start of the next academic year and have asked the PTA to help us raise funds for the interior fitting out of the library and updating of some of the books. We are looking to raise £10,000.





Children typically fear failure - but what if they knew *mistakes grew their brains*? Happily, there is a huge amount of research to prove it!

Here are science-backed tips for discussing some specific (and common) fears:

If your child fears **MAKING A MISTAKE...**

- Every error they make results in electrical signals firing that help them learn.
- Discuss a study that prove their brain "sparks and grows" whenever they make a mistake - and what it means about failure (Moser et al., 2011).

If your child fears **MAKING A WRONG GUESS...**

- Making guesses is one of the best ways to learn the material.
- Making an *incorrect* guess they think is right and *then being corrected* is even better! Something about making the wrong guess and learning the right one makes it easier for their brain to recall the correct answer in the future.

If your child fears **TACKLING DIFFICULT MATERIAL...**

- When learning challenging material, it's TRUE they (and everyone else) make more errors.
- It's also true they **retain** the information better. In fact, the *harder they have to work* to understand something, the *longer it lasts in their memory* and the more deeply it's processed.


When children understand the brain science behind why mistakes improve learning, it's easy to get them excited about the prospect.
