

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### Headmaster's Foreword

Welcome to the first Mayfield Magazine of the year, including many of the highlights of the first half term.

The Autumn Term is always a busy time at Mayfield, such that the half term seems to have flown by, and an awful lot has been packed into a short space of time! Here are some brief highlights by nature of an introduction to the greater details and colourful photographs to follow in this magazine.

As you know, Mayfield was inspected by the Independent Schools Inspectorate (ISI) from 24th to 26th September. While I am not yet allowed to reveal the inspection outcome, I can tell you how impressed the inspectors were with our children and staff and I can also tell you that the school has done very well, and I am very happy! The inspection report is currently undergoing quality assurance and is due to be published sometime soon. At this point, the report will be distributed to all parents of the school and published on the school website. The Governors and leadership team of the school would like to extend our thanks to all the staff for their consistent hard work, to all the parents for the positive feedback to inspectors and support for the school, and to all the children for being so amazing! I am very proud of you all and honoured to be the Headmaster of such a great school!

Our Lower III pupils have had a busy time. The term had barely started, and they were thrust into an intensive 4 weeks of 11+ entrance exams. Firstly, they sat the West Midlands grammar schools, now as one exam. This was followed by the King Edward's and King Edward's High schools' independent exams, EHS; and then Solihull will follow after half term. The results have started coming in and they are looking very positive.

This half term, we have invited parents from EYFS and Lower School to English Workshops to share how we teach English and how parents can support their children's learning. The Upper School English Workshop will be after half term.

This Wednesday, parents were invited to enjoy our Early Years Harvest Festival, featuring my favourite, 'Dingle, dangle scarecrow!' Then, on Thursday, many parents gathered in the Hall of the Olympians to enjoy the Main School Harvest Festival. The children did us proud, singing and reciting poems to celebrate harvest. Thanks to staff, particularly Mrs Gerighty, for preparing and conducting such a marvellous celebration. Thank you to everybody for your generous donations towards the Walsall Food Banks.

Thanks to the hardworking teachers who organised the disco, led the dancing and what an incredible DJ Mrs Pittaway is!

The children have quickly settled into their new routines in Nursery. This half term, they have enjoyed going out to Forest School every Friday. They have looked at different trees. They collected lots of leaves and sticks to use to make wands.

The children have started on their journey of learning to read with the Read, Write Inc Phonics scheme. In group time, they are learning to recognise some letters and to say the sound they make.

Nursery children love to do a range of creative activities from painting to singing and dancing. We invited the parents to come in and take part in a clay workshop with their child.

Every Thursday, the children go to The Hall of the Olympians. They have been learning to run, hop and balance on one leg. They have also started to develop their ball skills, practising throwing and catching.

Every day, the children have been developing their fine motor skills ready for writing. They enjoy cutting and threading as well as mark making

In our Maths lessons, the children are learning to count to 10 and to count groups of objects. Sometimes we use the big screen to help.






















Mrs S Rahman


It is also very busy inside our Pre-Nursery classroom. The children have enjoyed exploring different textures through a variety of craft activities.

The children have enjoyed individual reading sessions with their teacher and have developed confidence talking about stories.











We have had an exciting start to the school year and Kindergarten have settled in very well. We are getting used to new routines and walking around school. Our first topic 'All about me' has let us discover some exciting things about ourselves.

We are enjoying getting to know each other and all of the lovely grownups that work in our class. We had our own class vote for 'head Mr Men' and 'head Little Miss.' discussing their characters and attributes.

The children have really embraced our outdoor provision and have had lots of fun making use of the trim trails and playground markings! We have talked about our family and the people we live with.

The children are adapting well and embracing life in 'main school'. It is wonderful to see them working hard, knowing that they are laying the foundations for all of the fun that lays ahead. Keep it up, Kindergarten!













It has been a fantastic first half term in Transition and the children have produced some amazing work! In Geography, we have been learning about where our food comes from and found out all about the journey of milk, from farm to supermarket. As part of our learning, we collaged our own herd of Friesian cows. We have also been looking at a globe and maps to find out where the hot and cold areas of our planet are situated and identifying key geographical locations such as the Equator and the North and South Poles.


In DT, we used our design skills to design and build our own junk models and challenged ourselves to use different ways to join materials, such as flange joints, split pin and tape. We then used our creative thinking skills to tell a story about our creations.





### Form

It has been a tale of contrasts in Form I since they started their new academic year! In Art, we have been painting with warm colours, such as red, yellow and orange, and cold colours, such as purple, blue and green, which can affect the moods of the pictures we create. In Science, we have been investigating the different properties of materials, including the contrast between a sponge, which is absorbent, and plastic, which is not absorbent.

In Mathematics, we have compared tens and ones and contrasted addition and subtraction in terms of the operations studied. In Humanities, we have been learning about the seaside, which is ironic considering that Walsall is one of the furthest places from the beach in England!

In Physical Education, we have completed multi-skills activities, including football shots at goal, aiming a tennis ball at a cricket wicket and shooting basketballs into a hoop! Scott won this as a House competition, although it was very close.

In Geography, we have been studying maps and looking at human and physical features and in English we have contrasted how punctuation marks, such as full stops, exclamation marks and question marks, can affect the structure of different sentences.

In Religious Education, we have learnt about the creation of the World, the Jewish celebration of Shabbat, and how different kinds of fruit and vegetables are grown, either on, under or above the ground.

We have been very impressed with the way that Form I pupils have used the "kind hands, kind feet, kind speech" initiative at Mayfield and have helped each other to settle into their new class.





It's been a busy half term for Lower II moving up into Upper School, with new routines, different teachers and the start of swimming lessons. The children have all adapted quickly to the expectations and requirements of Lower II, becoming organised and independent learners. Well done, Lower II!

One new initiative the children have particularly enjoyed this half term is the introduction of their daily Mayfield C.A.T. (Critical and Analytical Thinking) question in English lessons. Critical thinking is the ability for the children to analyse facts and establish a judgement based on logic and reason. It is essential to develop this skill as they move through school, to better their social interactions, discuss topics more deeply and to be able to work with points of view that may differ from their own. Critical thinking encompasses many of the skills the children will need to access the school curriculum, and more so the curriculum of their later education. These skills include inventing, making analogies, formulating hypotheses and recommending alternatives. Critical thinking skills help children to filter the information they take in and select which pieces are most relevant to the task in hand.

Above, are a selection of the C.A.T questions the children have enjoyed over the last half term.







Form II enjoyed a writing workshop on dinosaurs provided by Pobble 365. They learnt how to build a story about a dinosaur using descriptive language, the senses and show not tell. Below are some extracts from their amazing work. They were able to use their C.A.T skills to creatively write a setting, a dinosaur character and use emotions in their descriptions. Well done, Form II, there are some budding authors among you!

"I could feel the cold breeze flowing across my body." (Soha). "The goosebumps appeared on my arms, and I felt hot." (Dhiyaan). "I froze. My heart pounded in my chest. The floor was rumbling!" 


