Headmaster's Foreword

Dear Staff, Pupils, Parents, Governors, Old Mayfieldians and Friends of the school,

It has been an unusually long Spring Term, and I'll explain why. Easter falls on the first Sunday following the first full moon after the Spring Equinox. The result this year is a very late Easter and hence school breaking up on 11th April, the latest I can ever remember ending the term before Easter!

Let us take a look back at the highlights of the last half term. The first major event took place at the end of February at the NEC when we took the school choir to Young Voices, the largest school choir event in the UK and featuring many young, famous performing artists. Great fun was had by all!



We have had a busy half term in kindergarten. Our topic has been all about food, this has included us learning about healthy and un-healthy foods. We made pancake faces on pancake day and made soup during one of our Art lessons. We had great fun dressing up for World Book Day and took part in an exciting 'book hunt' with Lower III - thankyou! We really enjoyed a visit from Little City, where we got the chance to explore different role play areas and occupations. This term in Pre-Nursery, the children have enjoyed hearing the stories about the different traditional tales. The children have been busy doing lots of various activities related to the traditional tale stories. The children enjoyed decorating a gingerbread man biscuit and they have tried some porridge. In Mathematics, the children have learnt the vocabulary for comparing sizes using the Goldilocks and the Three Bears story. We have also been learning about positional language. We had a visit from the Little City role play company. The children have had a lovely time playing outdoors as the weather has been amazing, and they have also loved getting involved in different types of messy play. It has been a busy and great half term.

Kindergarten









Transition have been developing their skills as historians this half-term, finding out about the eruption of Mount Vesuvius in Pompeii in 79AD. We began by looking at a fresco of a mystery person known as 'Sappho' and using our deduction skills to find out who she was and what her life may have been like. We found Italy and Pompeii on a map and then began to look at historical evidence to find out what life would have been like for those living in Pompeii 2000 years ago. We then looked at an animated timeline of the eruption itself and looked at some pieces of Primary and Secondary evidence. We used these to build up a picture about how the day unfolded for the residents of Pompeii. We then used watercolour paints to create our own masterpiece, called 'The Last Day of Pompeii.' We thought really carefully about which colours would convey the mood and atmosphere. We also showed off our amazing writing skills with our own diary entry. We will be finishing the topic by using our Science skills to make our own volcanic eruption!

On Tuesday 1st April, we visited Broadway Church to learn about the Easter story with Reverend Andrew and then Alan the organist demonstrated how the Pipe organ worked, and we were able to guess which pipes made high and low sounds. He then played a piece of music for us, and we really enjoyed hearing the different sounds!

In Mathematics, we have been measuring length, height and mass and working practically with rulers, cubes, paper clips and balance scales. We will finish off the half term by investigating volume and capacity.







Form I have been busy carrying out lots of investigative work to enhance their learning this term. We have been learning how to measure in our Mathematics lessons, using a ruler and cm for shorter objects like paper clips and a metre stick and metres for longer objects such as the length of the classroom, We have used balances and weighing scales to find out the mass of a range of resources within the room. We have used mathematical symbols to compare their weights and then order them from lightest to heaviest. We have then investigated volume and capacity.


In PSHE, we have been learning about the importance of friendships and what we can do to avoid falling out with our friends. The children created some lovely posters to enhance good friendships, including counting to ten and walking away from arguments and writing any concerns down at home to discuss with their friends the following day. We also engaged in team games in which the children worked together to achieve an objective.

During this half-term, the children enjoyed dressing up for World Book Day and engaged in a Connect 4 class competition, which Veer won! In RE, we have discussed the links between the season of Spring, the Christian story of Easter and the idea of new life. We visited St. Matthew's Church in Walsall in the last week of term where we found out about its history and visited the important features of the church itself, including the crypt, altar and font.

In Form II, the children have been learning about Sound in Science. They made vibrations using rice on a drum to see how sound travels. Then they learnt about how sounds can be made louder or quieter through the force of the vibrations. Next, they looked at pitch, using instruments to investigate the different ways higher and lower pitch tones can be made. This tied in with British Science week's theme of Change and Adapt, where Form II pupils made their own panpipes and experimented with water in bottles set at different levels.

Form II's favourite investigation was sound and distance, making string telephones (see photos below). They learnt the sound vibrations travel well through the solid cups and string. Finally, they ended their topic with a session on soundproofing using different materials and making their own instruments based on all the skills they have learnt this half term. Well done, all!

Lower II children have been making headlines of their own this term! The young journalists have been busy creating intriguing newspaper reports on two thrilling topics: The discovery of Mayfield Iron Age Hoard and the fictional newspaper report of when the space bat angel dragon swooped down to Earth, based on the novel, The Iron Man by Ted Hughes.

This cross-curricular learning was to enhance writing skills and encourage creativity among the children. With great enthusiasm, all the children delved into the mysterious story of The Mayfield Hoard, when a collection of treasures discovered in their very own school. The pupils explored the who, what, when, where, and why of this archaeological surprise and wrote about its impact on local history. In a more imaginative twist, the second newspaper report focused on the daring adventure of when the space bat angel dragon descended to Earth causing devastation and destruction. The pupils explored the fantastical event, recounting the chaos and fear it brought. Formal language and structured reports were key components, with the children learning the importance of presenting facts clearly and engaging their readers. The budding journalists also focused on writing strong introductions to hook their audience and conclusions that leave a lasting impression.

Mrs Guest were delighted with the dedication and skill displayed by all the young writers. The reports created not only demonstrate their understanding of newspaper writing conventions but also their ability to craft captivating stories.











Upper II have been working their socks off in Geography, preparing for a group presentation on climate change. The children were organised into groups and given team roles: leader, prioritiser, timekeeper, recorder and devil's advocate.

Each group has researched and investigated changes in the world's climate, from both a local, national and international perspective. They have audited our school's environmental effectiveness and will put forward suggestions and proposals to make our school and our families more climate change friendly.

The final presentations were incredible, and the effort that each and every one of them has put into this topic was on display. The winning team was the Climate Controllers, but every team performed exceptionally well. Super job, Upper II!

On Wednesday 5th March, Mr. Watts and I had the pleasure of taking eight mathematicians from Form II to the KES Mathematics Challenge. The day started with some fun warm-up activities. A crossnumber followed which involved solving tricky numerical clues. Both teams worked very well together. Afterwards, the teams were faced with a fast-paced mathematical relay. This involved answering lots of questions and lots of running!

A delicious lunch was on the menu next. All eight children devoured their main course and dessert, thoroughly enjoying every last mouthful! We went outside for a short break before heading back into school for a super, fun Mathematics lesson with Barney Maunder-Taylor. He encouraged the children to think about the probability when rolling two dice and how we could use this in games such as Monopoly.

The day concluded with a presentation in the performing arts centre by Barney Maunder-Taylor, who made us think about shape, time and capacity. He had us all mesmerized!

Finally, it was the moment everyone had been waiting for, the results! One team didn't quite place in the top three teams, but the other team came in SECOND place! The children were shocked and absolutely thrilled at the same time. An incredible performance by all the children.

Both teams were a credit to themselves and the school and I am proud of each and every one of them.

On Wednesday, 2nd April, I escorted an Upper II team of mathematicians to KES for their annual Maths Challenge.


Competition was as fierce as ever. We started with a challenging Cross Number puzzle, followed by a relay race, taking turns to answer maths problems as quickly as possible.


After a delicious lunch, we were treated to a maths lesson by a member of their staff and then a maths magic show from Dr Ken Farquhar.




Celebrations


